THIS TO THE END THAT OUR GREAT BLESSINGS MAY NEVER SPOIL US; THAT WE SHALL FOREVER LIVE IN THANKFUL CONTEMPLATION OF HIM WHO PRESIDES OVER US ALL.'

With each question, ask: (1) What is going on? (2) Where am I at fault? (3) What is my corrective measure?

- Am I willing to sacrifice the personal gain that might flow from service without anonymity?

- Do I try to influence or manipulate using charm, flattery, bribery, threat, or am I willing to operate solely based on sound principles?
- Can I look past superficial good or bad personality to the God within each person?
