

Step Three – HOW to turn over your will

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him.

Take Actions That Deflate Your Ego

Yes, the 3rd Step *starts* with the phrase “made a decision,” but despite what some overly literal AAs will tell you, it cannot end there. Once you have made the decision, you must take **ACTIONS** to turn over your will, or that decision is meaningless (i.e. “faith without works is dead”).

Turning over your will means reducing the influence of your ego. To deflate your ego, you must practice **relinquishing control** and **letting go of stories**.

Quieting the influence of your ego will feel unnatural and uncomfortable, and it will take conscious effort at first. But over time, through **PRACTICE**, it will get easier, and eventually it will become second nature.

Ask for Help

However you found your way to your first meeting, you either explicitly or implicitly asked for help. This was the very first way you practiced turning over your will – when you acknowledged that you couldn’t do it alone.

Continue turning over your will by remembering that you don’t have to face *any* problem alone. If you have questions, ask them! If you need help, ask for it! If you have important decisions to make, solicit advice from other sober people.

Take Suggestions

After asking for help, the next step in turning over your will is to act on the advice offered by those with more experience. Often, the **ACTION of taking the suggestion** is as important as or more important than the text of the suggestion. The power you take away from your ego will bring relief.

You may hear some crazy suggestions, but don’t try to use those as evidence that taking suggestions is a bad idea in general; try to stick to those suggestions you hear a lot. Remember that shopping around for the piece of advice that you *want* to hear – to justify what you’ve already decided to do – is just another form of alcoholic self-will.

Getting a sponsor formalized the process of taking suggestions, providing you with a person whose suggestions you agreed to take especially seriously. Sponsors will not abuse this privilege. If you trust your sponsor and treat his or her advice very gravely, you will experience relief from your ego’s reflexive desire to control everything.

Pray

Whether or not you believe in antihistamines, taking them will relieve allergy symptoms. Prayer is a lot like medicine: you don’t need to believe it’s going to work, or understand how it’s going to work, to get the benefits.

What, if anything, you pray to, is up to you; there are as many different concepts of a higher power as there are people in AA. But the one thing that all AAs have in common is the **ACTION** of praying.

I believe that the relief comes from the asking itself – the explicit, verbal acknowledgement that reliance on your ego is not the answer. Your belief may differ, but one thing is clear: it doesn’t come *without* the asking.

Here is a modernized, non-theist 3rd step prayer:
“**Thank you for keeping me sober. Please keep me sober today. Relieve me of the bondage of self. Show me how I can be of service. Help me to let go of my will.**”

Meditate

Don’t wait until the 11th step to start meditating. For alcoholics, the greatest benefit of meditation is the ability to quiet the ego through focus on the body in the moment. The ego tells stories, and stories require the past or the future; focusing on the present therefore *automatically* reduces the influence of the ego. Focusing on the body draws attention away from our thoughts.

Practice Acceptance

Demanding that the world be a certain way – or believing you would be happy if only some external conditions were met – may be the most common form of self-will. The truth is that you will not be happy until you learn to accept life on life’s terms.

When faced with a situation that you find unpleasant, she recommends saying “this, too, I can accept.” It’s difficult and requires practice to learn to employ this tactic. I highly recommend reading Tara Brach’s *Radical Acceptance* when you start practicing your third step.

Do the Fourth Step

If you could work a *perfect* 3rd step – completely turning over your will – the rest of the steps wouldn’t be necessary. But you can’t work a perfect 3rd, so keep trying and move forward! Think of Step 3 as a decision to turn over your will *by doing the rest of the steps*.

Symptoms of self-will

You are getting upset.....	You are calm.
You are telling endless stories in your head.....	You are not plagued by stories.
You are justifying your actions – to yourself or others.....	You feel no need to justify your actions.
You’re making a lot of plans.....	You are focused on the <i>next</i> right thing.
You think you can – or should – handle everything alone.....	You are open to help.
You argue with or reject the suggestions of others	You can let go and take suggestions without fear
